Learning to Rest

For the most part Americans don't value rest. We brag about how busy we are as if our hectic schedules are what give us self worth. Of all the countries in the world, Japan is the only one that takes less time for rest than America.

Believe it or not, God is very interested in our rest. To Him, rest is not wasted time, time when we could be doing something useful and productive. No. Rest, biblically understood, has value and worth and purpose. In fact, it's essential to our physical and spiritual well-being. Rest is the time when He can have our undivided, undistracted attention so that He might speak to and with us.

Lets rid ourselves of this idea that rest is somehow a waste of time by remembering God himself rests. If God rested then it is by definition a good thing. No one would accuse God of being lazy or unproductive. Yet the Bible tells us clearly that both God the Father and God the Son took time for rest. In Genesis, the story of creation we read,

"By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work. And God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done." — Genesis 2:2-3

Why does the Bible tell us this? **Because in the balance of work and rest is God's example for us.** It shows that we should follow a habit of ceasing from work and resting with the Lord.

Jesus said in Mark 6:31 – "Come away with Me..." (emphasis added) It is one of the greatest benefits of rest that it allows us to have uninterrupted, time with jesus apart form all the distractions of daily life. Notice also that Jesus and the disciples went away for a period of rest during a very busy time of ministry, physical, spiritual and emotional rest was deemed necessary by Jesus so that He and the disciples might return to the kingdom's work with renewed energy and focus.

One of the astonishing things about this passage is the fact that Jesus withdrew from the crowds just when he was most in demand. There were hundreds, perhaps thousands, of people waiting for Jesus to heal them, to teach them, to bless them. They were seeking. They were open. And yet, Jesus took some time to rest.

How un-American! Wasn't that irresponsible, to take a day off when there were so many people needing his help? Wasn't that a bit selfish? No, not at all. Jesus understood that there would always be those with needs. But in order to accomplish the purpose for which God had sent Him, he had to remain spiritually strong. And that required regular times of prayer and meditation, regular times of rest and recuperation.

Jesus does not demand, nor desire, that his children work to the point of exhaustion and burn-out. He knew that we need periods of rest with Him in order to remain focused and productive.

One of the most important functions of rest is to allow us to listen to God. Often, we get so caught up in the busy-ness of daily life that we can no longer hear the still, small voice of God. We become so busy doing things *for Christ* that we forget to simply be *with Christ*.

Have you learned the importance of rest in your Christian life? Do you regularly take time away from the relentless busy-ness of life to get away with Jesus, just sit down and talk to Him listen to Him and REST?

NEWS FROM NORWEGIAN LUTHERAN MISSION

Update from David Olson - Missionary to Mongolia

A lot has happened the past several months with my work in Mongolia with Norwegian Lutheran Mission. But there is always one thing that is the same and that is grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

I finished my first two full years serving in Mongolia in September of 2014 and then had the opportunity to travel back to North Dakota to be with my family for a few months. It was a welcomed time of rest and I was also able to spend time with my family which is always enjoyable. I then traveled back to Mongolia for November and December where I worked with our administration on different tasks related to our projects. At this time I was placed in Khovd, which is the western city in Mongolia where NLM has an office.

My busy winter was not done as I made another trip back and forth from North Dakota to Mongolia after Christmas. It has been a little different type of year for me as I have worked some in Mongolia and some in North Dakota. NLM is currently making plans to start another office in another location in western Mongolia where we have project work and a lot of my work and travel has been because of this. A final decision was made in March to start a new office in western Mongolia and I will have the exciting task to help open the new office starting this summer. It will be a challenge but we pray the Lord will be with us and will help open doors for our work in this new region.

Religious Freedom Under Attack in America-May 10, 2015

Religious freedom advocates are flagging a mostly-missed moment from last week's Supreme Court arguments over the constitutionality of same-sex marriage, calling it a warning sign.

They point to an exchange between Justice Samuel Alito and the administration's top lawyer, Solicitor General Donald Verrilli. Alito asked if, in the event the Supreme Court holds that there is a constitutional right to same-sex marriage, would religious colleges risk losing their tax-exempt status if they continued to advocate for traditional marriage only. Verrilli responded, "I don't deny that ... It is going to be an issue."

Travis Weber, director of the Family Research Council's Center for Religious Liberty, said he believed Verrilli's logic would eventually extend to churches and just about "anyone holding a traditional view of marriage."

Weber warned that if the current trend continues, those who refuse to endorse same-sex marriage could face "fines, potentially imprisonment."

Just days ago, speaking at the Women in the World Summit 2016, Democratic contender Hillary Clinton said, "Deep-seated cultural codes, religious beliefs and structural biases have to be changed."

The statement sparked concern among those who believe the federal government should not be in the business of using its significant leverage to coerce others to adhere to any specific viewpoint.
