Starting in a New City

“I am excited to move,” says David Samuel Olson. At this time both he and Karen Colban Hoel have moved and are getting settled in the city of Ulgii, Mongolia. NLM has implemented a health project in Bayan-Ulgii province for seven years and in the past year has also extended the social project to include this province.

Giving support to the project work

David thinks it is natural that NLM now is placing missionaries in Bayan-Ulgii. He believes there is still a need to strengthen both the health sector and social services sector in this area. Those of us who will be moving to Ulgii will support the current project work and hopefully pave the way to make it possible for other good project work for several years to come,” he says.

NLM has had missionaries in Khovd since 2008 and is just now placing missionaries in Ulgii, which is even further west in the country.

David has lived in Mongolia for three years. He has traveled back and forth the past winter and spring between North Dakota and Mongolia while working on different small tasks. David is actually an American but is sent as an NLM missionary.

Building relations

What will be your concrete tasks in Ulgii?

I will build up a new office.

And it will be Karen and my job to build on the relations we already have and build new relations. The first months will be important to build a good rapport with the government. NLM must

also begin to think about what kind of projects are wanted in the province in the future.

Our job and wish is to work closely with the government and other potential partners to start the process for developing new projects that can begin when our current projects are finished. So there will be a lot of project planning.” Karen is going to study Kazakh language the first year in addition to working as a consultant in the social services project. She will also assist with the planning of new projects.

“NLM has a clear and important wish to work in areas where the message of Jesus is little known,” says David. “Mongolia has experienced a lot of church growth in the past few years, but there are still few Christians in the western part of the country. But another important reason for working in Ulgii is because it is one of the poorest areas in the country. We are working through our projects so that those in need can have a better life, and at the same time we hope to show and tell people about what Jesus has done for all people by His death and resurrection.”

Country boy

You have worked in the capital Ulaanbaatar. How do you believe you will like Ulgii? I have always been more of a country boy, so I believe it will be good to get out of the big city,” answers David. Bayan-Ulgii is the westernmost province in Mongolia and has borders with China and Russia. A little further west is Kazakhstan. Mongolia does not share a border with Kazakhstan but the border only lies a few kilometers from Bayan-Ulgii's western border. It is about 140 miles between Khovd and Ulgii, and there is no airline connection between the two. The only way to

reach Khovd from Ulgii is by road with the first 40 miles being asphalt and the remaining miles gravel or dirt road.

David will have an important job in addition to work in Bayan-Ulgii starting this fall. He will become NLM's Country Director in Mongolia.

When does this happen?

"The plan is that I take over those responsibilities on November 1. I will have this job until a new Country Director is in Mongolia next summer. And I will actually continue to live in Ulgii even after I start those responsibilities. There will probably be some travel involved."

Must trust in God

What do you think about becoming the Country Director?

I am happy to help NLM with this responsibility even though I am maybe a little nervous thinking about it. But NLM currently has many good and capable leaders in Mongolia right now and they have promised to help me. I hope and pray that I can be a God-fearing and humble leader. I must trust in God that He will be with me and lead me in the decisions that must be taken."

Do you think this will be ok for an American?

"Yeah, good question!" laughs David. "Maybe I should not announce too much that I am an American! No, I believe everything will go well. I am very appreciative to NLM that they have asked me to take on this responsibility," finishes David Samuel Olson.

The American NLM by *Kristoffer Krohgn Sævre*

When Gabriel Eikli moved to Japan in 1949, a farmer from the USA sent a container to Japan which became Eikli's home in the beginning. Since it's beginning Hauge Foreign Mission has supported NLM economically. Brothers Jonathan and Joel Unverzagt are continuing their engagement as their grandparents did.

Many of the Norwegian immigrants that came to the Mid-West came from the Hauge Movement and took with them personal experience of salvation, service of the layman and simple worship. This is the basic in our services, says Jonathan Unverzagt, pastor and one of the leaders in the Hauge Mission. Together with his brother Joel and their wives they attended the NLM's General Assembly in Randaberg.

The Hauge Mission has never had their own missionaries, but we are sending support to the NLM, says Jonathan whom is the oldest of the grandchildren to pastor Alvin and Emma Larsen, who was a leader in the Hauge Foreign Mission for many years.

Received many missionaries.

The father of Joel and Jonathan died when they were small children so they lived with their grandparents during the summers.

-We had many missionaries from the NLM visiting us, like Jon Jøssang, Eikli, Finseth, and Gunnar Oseng. -We have tried to find Gunnar here at the General Assembly, have you seen him? asked Joel and looked all around at the General Assembly Hall. Our grandparents often took the Norwegian missionaries around to churches to get support.

The most important activities to the Hauge Mission today are the yearly Bible Camp. About 130 delegates meet. Half of the delegates are 20 years and younger. The dream of the Hauge Mission is that some of the young people will choose to become a missionary for the NLM.

It has been inspiring for us that an American is a missionary for the NLM today; it has strengthened our relation to the NLM. David Olson in Mongolia came from the same church as us, something that has given us inspiration. At the assembly we have a strong focus on mission and we are sending support to the NLM 6-7 times a year.

Thankful partners

Joel and Jonathan think the support from the Hauge Mission is modest compared to the total budget, but are thankful to be treated as a partner. in missions. The gifts to the NLM through the Hauge Mission are tax exempt, something that an individual cannot get without giving donation through an organization. We have regular visits from the NLM, this year we will have Tore Vågen visiting us and to tell and preach. Did I pronounce his name right? Asked Jonathan with a smile. None of them speak any Norwegian, but they have different people which can translate Utsyn-articles for them.

Organized as the NLM

Jonathan is a pastor in The Free Lutheran Congregations (AFLC), but Joel is a businessman and a leader of the Hauge Mission. They follow the debate with interest about the religious community in the NLM, even if it was a strange approach to the problem for the American brothers.

We have not had any State Church and regardless no strong attachment to this kind of church. I understand the arguments from both sides but believe that the USA's religious communities are so different in structure and have been established long time ago. *(That it's hard for us to understand all the implications of the debate. - Editors explanation)*

The Hauge Mission has no membership like the way the NLM is organized, but direct their mission work toward the young people. Youths which like to attend the HFM Bible Camp.

Our prayers are that many will be called of God to mission work.

We are so impressed over the General Assembly; there are so many families and young people here. We can see that the NLM has a heart and a purpose which we share. We are the American version of the NLM, concluded Jonathan Unverzagt.

News from EKE (Lutherans for the Gospel) in Hungary

Dear Reader, Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I would like to share with you our summer camp experiences. Our local church, the Lutheran Church in Csurgó, invited children and youth into three different camps this summer. By the grace of God, all three camps were spent and finished in a wonderful way. It was good to come together around the Word of God. It was good to see the smiles of children, parents and grandparents. It was good to see the contribution-in-kind and other sorts of help from generous brothers and sisters. God's grace made this year special, since we, together with the Good News to Every Home Foundation, held a town mission week as well.

The third daytime camp for children was held between June 29 and July 3, with the motto "The Never-Ending Journey." A journey for all of us, so that the course of our lives could not be measured in years only, but it could really be an endless, eternal journey. But how can someone realize this? What do I have to do to make my life really an eternal journey, not just a "long journey?" The Apostle Paul and his journeys helped us with that. His way to Damascus turned into a new and life-changing journey, for he met the Living Lord Jesus. This encounter changed everything. If only a lot more people met Jesus in their lives! If only a lot more people could decide for Jesus, and start a new, eternal life! There were 21 children and adults in this camp altogether. Apart from those living here, children also came from Iharosberény, Nagyatád, and Berzence.

Thanks to all of our helpers, Lilla Jeszencsák, Anna Krizsán, Dominika Papp, Dávid Szerecz, and Vivien Dobis. Thanks to Bernadett Szaka for teaching folk dances, and to Anikó Szerecz for craft programs. Thanks to the employees of the museum in Csurgó for receiving and guiding us. Thanks to Zsuzsa and Kata, the kitchen helpers. To God be the glory! May He pour out His Holy Spirit on us, and let our lives be an endless journey.

The fourth daytime guitar camp was held between July 6 and 10. It was about playing on the guitar, leading singing, and worshiping God—most importantly, with attention to God, our Creator, Who is worthy of praising His name. In the mornings, we received an in-depth teaching of music theory. We learned about the basic ideas including chords of three or four notes. The afternoons were spent by practicing, playing on the guitars. Practical training was done in several groups. I led the group of beginners, while advanced guitar players were led by Lilla Jeszencsák, Dominika Papp, Dávid Szerecz and Pastor Márton Kulcsár. Rebeka Molnár taught teens with upper-advanced guitar knowledge. We say thanks for their ministries; to God be the glory! The campers, both beginners and advanced, made a great progress. May God grant them that this could inspire them to further education, ministry and praising God.

From July 20 to 25, we were together with nearly 80 campers in a camp organized by the EKE mission foundation, in the Bethel Mission Home in Piliscsaba. We set off from the Lutheran church in Csurgó on Monday afternoon, with seven participants. In the evening, our minibus reached the beautiful village of Piliscsaba. The theme of the camp was especially relevant: A self-adorer meets the “I Am”, that is, the work of God in the life of Joseph. A famous person once said, “Egoism is the beginning of all kinds of ‘ism’”. “This person was right, it is perfectly so. All kinds of “ism” begin with egoism, adoring ourselves as gods. Joseph, the spoilt son of Jacob, is being formed in God’s hands. In the depth of the well, he decides for God. He could no longer count on people; by telling bad news of his brothers, he had lost their trust and love. The first two days were related to this: “On your own way, on the way of the world – Dreams and bad news”, Gen 37:2–11, and “In depth and misery – Well and slavery”, Gen 37:18–36; 39. On the third and the next days, we learned about the walking in new life, through the life of Joseph already obeying God. “Walking with the Lord in our individual fights – Steadfast in the whirlpool of flesh and money”, Gen 39:1–23; “To be forgiven and to forgive – Distribute God’s grace”, Gen 41:1–11 and Gen 45:1–15; “Instruments in saving lives – Conscious soul saving”, Gen 41:46–57 and Gen 46:1–6. Many of the young campers were inspired to wake up and turn to God. One issue remains: where are we—in the slavery of self-adoration, or another idol, or do we serve God? Dear reader, have you woken up from spiritual sleeping? Do you fight the good fight of faith?

From August 10 to 16, our local church and the Good News to Every Home Foundation organized a Town Mission week. What does it mean? The co-workers of the foundation and our church visited every home in Csurgó and in Szentá (the village next to us), inviting everyone to the weekend events, giving them tracts. They prayed together with the family if that was needed, or they gave Bibles and other literature to those who lacked and needed them. There was a film club on Saturday night; then on Sunday, we had a family program with the Harmony group of singers, and a slide show on the issue of daily bread. Many people think of them as some special kind of people. They are not. Most of them are Evangelical-Lutherans, like us, serving together with Reformed and Baptist people. What makes them different is that they do something for the Lord. They listen and obey to Him—for some time in their lives, Jesus found them, called them to new life, and they said yes to the call, decided for Jesus. They are born-again, spiritually strong people, who can bear burdens of others. Dear reader, where are you in faith? Have you been born again? Do you grow in spirit? Let this nice song encourage all of us.

I (Jamie) was training one of our new Papua New Guinean employees about how to load our airplanes. During that time I learned that he was from the Madak language on the island of New Ireland. He had lived in the capital city, Port Moresby, for the past 18 years and was not aware of the translation work that had been done in his language. One morning, as we continued his training, I brought a copy of the Madak New Testament and Madak hymn book to work and handed them to him. He looked down at them and then up at me with eyes open wide, as if to say, "I can't believe what you have just handed me." A couple of days later I asked him if he had been able to read any of the New Testament or sing any songs. He told me, "God is now so close; before when I sang songs in the trade language He wasn't close." What a privilege it is to be a part of giving the Word of God and other materials to people in their own language!
